designed for the highest possible XC potential and stability. This is where I see the target group: if you are looking for a thoroughbred XC mile-eater with which you can be blown into vicious lees, which you can also accelerate mercilessly in moving air and on which you can rely when the wind blows hard, then you can eye up this wing. In this respect, it is made for brave ridge riders and leeside thermal crankers of the Alps. Conversely, anyone who flies in thermally weak areas, like in the flatlands, has to figure out exactly whether their "seat-of-thepants feel" is sensitive enough to know when to pull their lines. The Mentor 7 Light is more of a jet than a sailplane.
